WHAT DOES IT MEAN? - STEPS TO CHRIST, CHAPTER 1

Degradation

A reducing in rank; the act of depriving one of a degree of honor, of dignity, or of rank; also, deposition;

The state of being reduced from an elevated or more honorable station, to one that is low in fact or in estimation; baseness; degeneracy.

Diminution or reduction of strength, efficacy or value.

Elevate

To exalt; to raise to higher state or station; as, to elevate a man to an office.

To improve, refine or dignify; to raise from or above low conceptions; as, to elevate the mind. To raise from a low or common state; to exalt; as, to elevate the character; to elevate a nation.

Enormity

Literally, the transgression of a rule, or deviation from right. Hence, any wrong, irregular, vicious or sinful act, either in government or morals.

Atrocious crime; flagitious villainy; a crime which exceeds the common measure.

Atrociousness; excessive degree of crime or guilt. Punishment should be proportioned to the enormity of the crime.

Hypocrisy

Simulation; a feigning to be what one is not; or dissimulation, a concealment of one's real character or motives. More generally, hypocrisy is simulation, or the assuming of a false appearance of virtue or religion; a deceitful show of a good character, in morals or religion; a counterfeiting of religion.

Simulation; deceitful appearance; false pretence.

Intercourse

Communication; commerce; connection by reciprocal dealings between persons or nations, either in common affairs and civilities, in trade, or correspondence by letters.

Silent communication or exchange.

Propitiation

The atonement or atoning sacrifice offered to God

Alienate

To estrange; to withdraw, as the affections; to make indifferent or averse, where love or friendship before subsisted; with from; as, to alienate the heart or affections; to alienate a man from the friends of his youth.

Apostasy

An abandonment of what one has professed; a total desertion, or departure from one's faith or religion.

Arbitrary

Depending on will or discretion; not governed by any fixed rules; as, an arbitrary decision; an arbitrary punishment.

Decree

In general, an order, edict or law made by a superior as a rule to govern inferiors. Established law, or rule.

In theology, predetermined purpose of God; the purpose or determination of an immutable Being, whose plan of operations is, like himself, unchangeable.

Endowed

Furnished with a portion of estate; having dower settled on; supplied with a permanent fund; indued.

Holiness

The state of being holy; purity or integrity of moral character; freedom from sin; sanctity.

Noble

Great; elevated; dignified; being above every thing that can dishonor reputation

Retribution

Repayment; return accommodated to the action; reward; compensation.

Repentance includes sorrow for sin and a turning away from it. We shall not renounce sin unless we see its sinfulness; until we turn away from it in heart, there will be no real change in the life.

Conscience

Internal or self-knowledge, or judgment of right and wrong; or the faculty, power or principle within us, which decides on the lawfulness or unlawfulness of our own actions and affections, and instantly approves or condemns them.

Contrition

Penitence; deep sorrow for sin; grief of heart for having offended and infinitely holy and benevolent God. The word is usually understood to mean genuine penitence, accompanied with a deep sense of ingratitude in the sinner, and sincere resolution to live in obedience to the divine law.

Lament

To mourn; to grieve; to weep or wail; to express sorrow.

To regret deeply; to feel sorrow.

Quickened

Made alive; revived; vivified; reinvigorated.

Virtue

Moral goodness; the practice of moral duties and the abstaining from vice, or a conformity of life and conversation to the moral law.

TASKS

Ask Him to give you repentance, to reveal Christ to you in His infinite love, in His perfect purity.

Christ is ready to set us free from sin, but He does not force the will; ... "Behold, now is the accepted time; behold, now is the day of salvation." "Today if ye will hear His voice, harden not your hearts."

Go to Him with your soul all stained as it is. Like the psalmist, throw its chambers open to the all-seeing eye, exclaiming, "Search me, O God, and know my heart: try me, and know my thoughts: and see if there be any wicked way in me, and lead me in the way everlasting.

Let it be your prayer, "Create in me a clean heart, O God; and renew a right spirit within me." Psalm 51:10. Deal truly with your own soul. Be as earnest, as persistent, as you would be if your mortal life were at stake. This is a matter to be settled between God and your own soul, settled for eternity.

Study God's word prayerfully. That word presents before you, in the law of God and the life of Christ, the great principles of holiness, without which "no man shall see the Lord." Hebrews 12:14. It convinces of sin; it plainly reveals the way of salvation. **Give heed to it** as the voice of God speaking to your soul.

As you see the enormity of sin, as you see yourself as you really are, **do not give up to despair**. It was sinners that Christ came to save.

When Satan comes to tell you that you are a great sinner, look up to your Redeemer and talk of His merits. That which will help you is to look to His light. Acknowledge your sin, but tell the enemy that "Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners" and that you may be saved by His matchless love

Benumbing – Benum

Deprav(e)-ing

Indulge[d]

To permit to be or to continue; to suffer; not to restrain or oppose; as, to indulge sloth; to indulge the passions; to indulge pride, selfishness or inclinations.

Procrastination

A putting off to a future time; delay;

Submission

The act of submitting; the act of yielding to power or authority; surrender of the person and power to the control or government of another.

Obedience; compliance with the commands or laws of a superior.

"He that covereth his <u>sins</u> shall not prosper: but whoso <u>confesseth and</u> <u>forsaketh them</u> shall have <u>mercy</u>."

The apostle says, "Confess your faults one to another, and pray one for another, that ye may be healed." James 5:16. Confess your sins to God, who only can forgive them, and your faults to one another. If you have given offense to your friend or neighbor, you are to acknowledge your wrong, and it is his duty freely to forgive you. Then you are to seek the forgiveness of God, because the brother you have wounded is the property of God.

The only reason why we do not have remission of sins that are past is that we are not willing to <a href="https://example.com/humble

True confession is always of a <u>specific character</u>, and <u>acknowledges</u> <u>particular sins</u>. ... all confession should be <u>definite</u> and to the point, acknowledging the very sins of which you are guilty.

Confession will not be acceptable to God without sincere repentance and reformation. There must be decided changes in the life; everything offensive to God must be put away. This will be the result of genuine sorrow for sin. ..."Wash you, make you clean; put away the evil of your doings from before Mine eyes; cease to do evil; learn to do well; seek judgment, relieve the oppressed, judge the fatherless, plead for the widow."

Convicted

Proved or determined to be guilty, ...by the decision of conscience.

Guilt

Criminality; that state of a moral agent which results from his actual commission of a crime or offense, knowing it to be a crime, or violation of law. To constitute guilt there must be a moral agent enjoying freedom of will, and capable of distinguishing between right and wrong, and a wilful or intentional violation of a known law, or rule of duty. 

Allegiance

Without Me ye can do nothing." John 15:4, 5. You are just as dependent upon Christ, in order to live a holy life, as is the branch upon the parent stock for growth and fruitfulness.

By faith you became Christ's, and by faith you are to grow up in Him--by giving and taking. You are to give all,--your heart, your will, your service,--give yourself to Him to obey all His requirements; and you must take all,--Christ, the fullness of all blessing, to abide in your heart, to be your strength, your righteousness, your everlasting helper,--to give you power to obey.

Consecrate yourself to God in the morning; make this your very first work. Let your prayer be, "Take me, O Lord, as wholly Thine. I lay all my plans at Thy feet. Use me today in Thy service. Abide with me, and let all my work be wrought in Thee." This is a daily matter. Each morning consecrate yourself to God for that day. Surrender all your plans to Him, to be carried out or given up as His providence shall indicate. Thus day by day you may be giving your life into the hands of God, and thus your life will be molded more and more after the life of Christ.

Your hope is not in yourself; it is in Christ. Your weakness is united to His strength, your ignorance to His wisdom, your frailty to His enduring might. So you are not to look to yourself, not to let the mind dwell upon self, but look to Christ. Let the mind dwell upon His love, upon the beauty, the perfection, of His character. Christ in His self-denial, Christ in His humiliation, Christ in His purity and holiness, Christ in His matchless love -- this is the subject for the soul's contemplation. It is by loving Him, copying Him, depending wholly upon Him, that you are to be transformed into His likeness.

Commit the keeping of your soul to God, and trust in Him. Talk and think of Jesus. Let self be lost in Him. Put away all doubt; dismiss your fears. Say with the apostle Paul, "I live; yet not I, but Christ liveth in me: and the life which I now live in the flesh I live by the faith of the Son of God, who loved me, and gave Himself for me." Galatians 2:20. Rest in God.

The church of Christ is God's appointed agency for the salvation of men. Its mission is to <u>carry the gospel to the world</u>. And the <u>obligation rests upon all Christians</u>. Everyone, to the extent of his talent and opportunity, is to <u>fulfill the Saviour's commission</u>.

In the <u>humblest duties</u> and <u>lowliest positions of life</u>, we may walk and work with Jesus.

Everyone who names the name of Christ should so work that others, by seeing his good works, may be led to glorify their Creator and Redeemer.

One passage studied until its significance is clear to the mind and its relation to the plan of salvation is evident, is of more value than the perusal of many chapters with no definite purpose in view and no positive instruction gained. Keep your Bible with you. As you have opportunity, read it; fix the texts in your memory. ... We cannot obtain wisdom without earnest attention and prayerful study... Scripture must be compared with scripture. There must be careful research and prayerful reflection.

As the miner discovers veins of precious metal concealed beneath the surface of the earth, so will he who <u>perseveringly searches</u> the word of God as for hid treasure find truths of the greatest value, which are concealed from the view of the careless seeker. The words of inspiration, <u>pondered in the heart</u>, will be as streams flowing from the fountain of life. Never should the Bible be studied without prayer. Before opening its pages we should ask for the enlightenment of the Holy Spirit, and it will be given.

When Jesus was upon the earth, He taught His disciples how to pray. He directed them to <u>present</u> their <u>daily needs before God</u>, and to <u>cast all</u> their <u>care upon Him</u>. ... Jesus Himself, while He dwelt among men, was often in prayer. Our Saviour identified Himself with our needs and weakness, in that He became a suppliant, a petitioner, <u>seeking</u> from His Father <u>fresh supplies</u> <u>of strength</u>, that He might come forth braced for duty and trial. <u>He is our example in all things</u>.

If the Saviour of men, the Son of God, felt the need of prayer, how much more should feeble, sinful mortals feel the necessity of <u>fervent, constant</u> prayer.

There are certain conditions upon which we may expect that God will hear and answer our prayers....One of the first of these is that we <u>feel our need</u> of help from Him. ... The <u>heart must be open</u> to the Spirit's influence, or God's blessing cannot be received.

If we regard iniquity in our hearts, if we cling to any known sin, the Lord will not hear us; but the prayer of the penitent, contrite soul is always accepted. When all known wrongs are righted, we may believe that God will answer our petitions. ... Another element of prevailing prayer is faith. "He that cometh to God must believe that He is, and that He is a rewarder of them that diligently seek Him." Hebrews 11:6. Jesus said to His disciples, "What things soever ye desire, when ye pray, believe that ye receive them, and ye shall have them." Mark 11:24. Do we take Him at His word?

When we do not receive the very things we asked for, at the time we ask, we are <u>still to believe</u> that the Lord hears and that He will answer our prayers.

When our prayers seem not to be answered, we are to <u>cling to the</u> <u>promise</u>; for the time of answering will surely come, and we shall receive the blessing we need most

<u>Do not fear to trust Him</u>, even though you do not see the immediate answer to your prayers. <u>Rely upon His sure promise</u>, "Ask, and it shall be given you."

<u>Perseverance in prayer</u> has been made a condition of receiving. We must <u>pray always</u> if we would grow in faith and experience. We are to be <u>"instant in prayer</u>," to <u>"continue in prayer</u>, and <u>watch in the same with thanksgiving</u>." Romans 12:12; Colossians 4:2. Peter exhorts believers to be <u>"sober, and watch unto prayer</u>." 1 Peter 4:7. Paul directs, "In everything by prayer and supplication <u>with thanksgiving</u> let your requests be made known unto God." Philippians 4:6. "But ye, beloved," says Jude, "<u>praying in the Holy Ghost, keep yourselves in the love of God."</u> Jude 20, 21.

There is necessity for <u>diligence in prayer</u>; let <u>nothing hinder you</u>...<u>Seek</u> every opportunity to go where prayer is wont to be made.

We should <u>pray</u> in the family circle, and above all we must <u>not neglect</u> <u>secret prayer</u>, for this is the life of the soul.

Pray in your closet, and as you go about your daily labor **let your heart be** often uplifted to God.

We should have the <u>door of the heart open continually</u> and our invitation going up that Jesus may come and abide as a heavenly guest in the soul.

Keep your wants, your joys, your sorrows, your cares, and your fears before God. You cannot burden Him; you cannot weary Him... Take to Him everything that perplexes the mind. Nothing is too great for Him to bear, for He holds up worlds, He rules over all the affairs of the universe.

But to <u>pray in the name of Jesus</u> is something more than a mere mention of that name at the beginning and the ending of a prayer. It is to <u>pray in the mind and spirit of Jesus, while we believe His promises, rely upon His grace, and work His works.</u>

He who does nothing but pray will soon cease to pray, or his prayers will become a formal routine. When men take themselves out of social life, away from the sphere of **Christian duty and cross bearing**; when they cease to **work earnestly for the Master**, who worked earnestly for them, they lose the subject matter of prayer and have no incentive to devotion. Their prayers become personal and selfish. They cannot **pray in regard to the wants of humanity or the upbuilding of Christ's kingdom**, **pleading for strength wherewith to work.**

"If rational beings really desire the truth, God will give them sufficient light to enable them to decide what is truth. If they have a heart to obey, they will see sufficient evidence to walk in the light. But if they in heart desire to evade the truth, he will not work a miracle to gratify their unbelief. He will never remove every chance or occasion to doubt. If they honestly, sincerely grasp the light, and walk in it, that light will increase until lingering doubts will be dispelled. But if they choose darkness, their questioning and caviling over the truth will increase, their unbelief will be strengthened, and the light which they would not accept will become to them darkness, and how great will be that darkness! It will be as much greater than before the light came, as the light which was rejected was clearer and more abundant than the light which first shone upon them. Thus it was with the Jewish nation; thus it will be with the Christian world in every generation. The rejectors of light treasure up to themselves wrath against the day of wrath. There are those who walk amid perpetual doubts. They feed on doubts, enjoy doubts, talk doubts, and question everything that it is for their interest to believe. To those who thus trifle with the plain testimonies of God's word, and who refuse to believe because it is inconvenient and unpopular to do so, the light will finally become darkness; truth will appear to the darkened understanding as error, and error will be accepted as truth. When thus shrouded in error, they will find it perfectly natural and convenient to believe what is false, and will become strong in their faith." - Review and Herald, January 5, 1886

TASKS

Christ has said, "If any man willeth to do His will, he shall know of the teaching." John 7:17, R.V. Instead of questioning and caviling concerning that which you do not understand, give heed to the light that already shines upon you, and you will receive greater light. By the grace of Christ, perform every duty that has been made plain to your understanding, and you will be enabled to understand and perform those of which you are now in doubt.

God invites us **to prove for ourselves the reality of His word**, the truth of His promises. He bids us <u>"taste and see that the Lord is good."</u> Psalm 34:8. Instead of depending upon the word of another, we are to taste for ourselves. He declares, <u>"Ask, and ye shall receive."</u> John 16:24. His promises will be fulfilled.

Peter exhorts his brethren to "grow in grace, and in the knowledge of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ." 2 Peter 3:18. When the people of God are growing in grace, they will be constantly obtaining a clearer understanding of His word. They will discern new light and beauty in its sacred truths.

All have trials; griefs hard to bear, temptations hard to resist. <u>Do not tell</u> <u>your troubles to your fellow mortals, but carry everything to God in prayer</u>. Make it a rule <u>never to utter one word of doubt or discouragement</u>. You can do much to <u>brighten the life of others and strengthen their efforts, by words of hope and holy cheer</u>.

There is many a brave soul **sorely pressed by temptation**, almost ready to faint in the conflict with self and with the powers of evil. **Do not discourage** such a one in his hard struggle. Cheer him with <u>brave</u>, hopeful words that shall urge him on his way.

If we keep uppermost in our minds the unkind and unjust acts of others we shall find it impossible to love them as Christ has loved us; but if our thoughts dwell upon the wondrous love and pity of Christ for us, the same spirit will flow out to others. We should love and respect one another, notwithstanding the faults and imperfections that we cannot help seeing. Humility and self-distrust should be cultivated, and a patient tenderness with the faults of others. This will kill out all narrowing selfishness and make us large-hearted and generous.

You may be perplexed in business; your prospects may grow darker and darker, and you may be threatened with loss; but <u>do not become</u> <u>discouraged</u>; <u>cast your care upon God</u>, and <u>remain calm and cheerful</u>. <u>Pray for wisdom</u> to manage your affairs with discretion, and thus prevent loss and disaster. Do all you can on your part to bring about favorable results. Jesus has promised His aid, but not apart from our effort. When, relying upon our Helper, you have done all you can, accept the result cheerfully.

The Lord would have all His sons and daughters <u>happy</u>, <u>peaceful</u>, <u>and</u> obedient.

Let us **not cast away our confidence**, but <u>have firm assurance</u>, firmer than **ever before**....Let us <u>keep fresh in our memory</u> all the tender mercies that **God has shown us**,--the tears He has wiped away, the pains He has soothed, the anxieties removed, the fears dispelled, the wants supplied, the blessings bestowed,--thus strengthening ourselves for all that is before us through the remainder of our pilgrimage.

The trial will not exceed the strength that shall be given us to bear it. Then let us <u>take up our work just where we find it</u>, believing that whatever may come, strength proportionate to the trial will be given.
